## This newsletter needs your help —

In April of 2005 Williams Park printed the first piece carrying the masthead you see above. In the 13 years since, we've published 53 issues encompassing 422 pages comprised exclusively of content from, about and for neighborhood residents.

I've been at the helm throughout. Editing

and publishing this newsletter has been fun and engaging but now it's time for me to hand the MEMO over to a new editor or co-editors. Might that be you? I'll retire after the March issue — that

should provide adequate time to pass the reins along responsibly.

Realistically, there are two positions that need to be filled, both of which I've been handling.

Content Editor: communicates with contributors to maintain a stream of newly created content, organizes submitted material, edits text as needed, passed files on to Layout Editor.

Layout Editor: chooses images which best illustrate the stories, determines where items occur within the issue, and executes the page layouts.

The issue then goes to proofreaders, after which the editors make corrections and create a final PDF file to be sent out to the community. For each issue, this takes approximately 10 to 15 hours of volunteer time and the schedule repeats every three months.

Laura Fine, who has been an editorial assistant for the past year, has agreed to step up into one of these roles. (Though, since she's six months pregnant, she won't be available for the March issue ). She and I both feel that a committee of three people



(including her) would work best, accommodating fluctuations in people's schedules while still maintaining the newsletter's consistency and quality. Unfortunately, if we're unable to find new editors, the December *MEMO* will likely be the last.

We have a wonderful group of writers, photographers, proofreaders and behindthe-scenes infrastructure that contribute to this newsletter regularly, and great ideas about various directions in which the MEMO could be taken. I hope you'll consider helping to continue this neighborhood tradition. # dining out close to home...by laura fine

Atmosphere: ★ ★ ★ ★ ☆ ☆

You've likely driven past Tasty China a dozen times and never looked twice at it. It's located in a small strip mall on the side of busy Atlanta Road, with darkly tinted windows and a sign that looks more like it serves bad take-out than anything authentic. I was pretty skeptical when a friend suggested we go there for lunch, but when you walk through the door you actually find a nice restaurant actually find a nice restaurant behind the facade, complete with a water feature, full bar and a variety of table types szechuan cuisine including several large round tables (for roughly a dozen people) with the lazy susan centerpiece typical of high-end Chinese restaurants. It was quiet at lunch time, with a tasty china relaxing atmosphere.

The menu is extensive, but the chef specializes in Szechuan food, which highlights the Szechuan pepper. This pepper isn't hot like most peppers (although they use plenty of hot peppers as well), but leaves the tongue with a numb, tingly feeling which sensitizes your taste buds and

augments the other flavors in the food. We ordered the Scallion Bubble Pancake as an appetizer and both the Sizzling Fish with Bamboo Shoots and the Szechuan Chicken as entrees for lunch. The pancake was exciting to look at when it came to the table and fun to eat, but ultimately just a light piece of savory pastry with a dipping sauce.

The real highlights were the entrees which were, first of all, enormous. The two of us ate a full lunch, then each took home half of what was left. My leftovers lasted another two meals easily! At first I thought it was a little expensive for lunch, but you definitely get what you pay for and then some. Not only that, but it lived up to its name and was tasty to boot.

The Sizzling Fish did just that — it came on a platter similar to fajitas in a Mexican

restaurant, bubbling and steaming as it arrived at the table. There were vegetables in a delicious sauce with the succulent fish that melted in your mouth.

The Szechuan chicken was spicy and numbing with tender-crisp vegetables.

Both were served with a big pile of rice. Full disclosure: the food here is spicy. Even the fish, which was labeled mild, had a good kick to it. The Szechuan chicken was at the limits of my spicy tolerance. I'm not a glutton for spicy pain, mind you, so to give you a better idea, I love adding Crystal's or Cholula to my food but this was much spicier than either of those. If you don't want spicy, choose something from the "American Chinese" section.

The service was almost overly attentive, although it's possible our waiter was a manager-in-training. He was very eager to confirm how our experience was going and I think we were both relieved when I finished my


water and he had something to do other than ask how the food was for the fifth time. Although for all his attention, he wasn't particularly knowledgeable about the food when we asked for details about a few dishes before ordering. In his defense, the menu is over a dozen pages long and I got the impression he was new.

All in all, I would recommend Tasty China as exactly that — tasty, authentic chinese food. To get better you'd have to make the schlep all the way to Duluth or Buford Highway, and we are pretty lucky to have this right at our doorstep. I think it'd be more economical for a large group of people than just two — Chinese food has a way of wanting to be served family style — but it's worth it either way.





friends, is tasked with returning the items to their rightful owners.




