Williams Park Drinks...

WINE COMPETITIONS ARE HELD in several locations in the U.S.: Chicago, Napa Valley, San Francisco, New York, and Atlanta. At the Atlanta competition, called The Summit, between 1200 and 1400 wines are tasted and judged by a panels of six judges per table. Wineries pay \$50 to enter a bottle in hope of winning a medal which will help in marketing. Louisa and I judged at The Summit for four years (more work than you think). Each judge will taste and pass judgment on 40 to 50 bottles each night. From this judging medals are awarded-gold, silver, and bronze (just like the Olympics). They also designate what is best of class, i.e., best Chardonnay below \$15 or best above \$15.

A favorite place of ours to buy wine in Atlanta is at Total Wines (next to Target on Barrett Parkway). With over 8,000 different wines, over 1,000 beer labels plus liquor, their prices are extremely reasonable. For example, a bottle of wine (\$14) I bought at a local wine store for \$14, cost \$5 less at Total Wines.

Here are some of the wines we've tasted and enjoyed. You may or may not like them. One person's "great" is another person's "I don't like it."



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NOTES

Here's a suggestion made recently by a Smyrna Police Officer. When you buy something expensive (TVs, computers, and such), don't put the intact box on the curb for pick-up.
