
WPN chili cook-off brings 'em out — by Keith Bentley



WP Travels — Jill Huitron

Just a few weeks ago, coming back from holiday, , Daniel and I were faced with a nine hour layover in Amsterdam. Well, we couldn't pass up the opportunity to head into town since we were so close! Just off the train and walking down Kalver Straat outside Central Station, we came to a place where people were setting up for what looked like a concert. In front of the Royal Palace and the Nieuwe Kerk, or new church (built 600 years ago), people were starting to gather in a huge open square. We learned that Saint Nicholas, or Sinterklaas, was coming to town that day!

According to Dutch tradition, Saint Nicholas lives in Spain and journeys to the Netherlands by boat each year. He and his helper, Zwarte Piet (which means Black Peter in Dutch), arrive at Amsterdam usually on November 13th. This year there were lots of helpers, all dressed like what we would call clowns, in bright colored garments that were comical looking, and they all had black faces and hands. Zwarte Piet led the procession through town throwing sweets and pepernoten (hard cookies) to the kids out of their burlap sacks. Sinterklaas rides along with them on a white horse. November 13th, when Sinterklaas comes to town, is a rowdy and noisy day of fun, laughter, singing and celebration!

Sinterklass stays around watching boys

and girls for a couple of weeks, then visits homes on December 5th. Before going to bed, kids leave carrots and hay in their shoes along with a pail of water for Sinterklaas' horse. If the children have been good, the horse will eat those treats and Sinterklaas will refill the shoes with candy or small gifts. Bad children don't get anything. Christmas day is a quieter day—usually people go to church and spend time with family.

What luck to be in Amsterdam when Sinterklaas arrived for a rowdy and noisy day of fun, laughter, singing and celebration!

You should know

Here are three great food sources known to some in Williams Park but, I'm sure, not to all. It's worth your while to become familiar with these places. Bon appetite!

Atlanta Smokehouse Products is located in the industrial park across Cobb Parkway from Dobbins landing airstrip (at 1700 Enterprise Way, Unit 107). They sell 20 or 30 different types of smoked fish plus caviar (not in my budget). Most of their smoked fish ships to delicatessens in New York and Chicago. Of course they also sell their products to Atlanta locations. Some 95% of their products sell commercially—only 5% is sold to individuals. You can check them out on line at www.blackcaviarusa.com or, better yet, go on over there in person.

Costa's Pasta, located off Hwy. 41 in Kennesaw, supplies fresh pasta, ravioli, tortellini and such to restaurants in Atlanta. They also do a fair amount of catering. They sell their ravioli (10 types) plus dinners for two and large dinners on order. So if you have a crowd coming, you can pick up a large dinner or two and your job is done. Prices are reasonable. A box of 24 raviolis is \$14 and a chicken parmesan dinner for two is \$12. Check out their web site at www.costaspasta.com where they'll tell you, "Our products are all natural, nothing artificial, and we happily use cage free eggs."

Patak-Bohemia is a European meat and

sausage producer hiding in a residential area of Austell (4107 Ewing Rd.). They sell 77 different kinds of sausages, salamis, cold cuts, plus the most beautiful steaks and pork chops you'll ever see. Their prices are remarkably low. Usually in the \$3 to \$3.50 per pound range. They have eight types of salami and they're happy to give you a taste. Italian sausage is \$2.49 lb.—take that Publix! Learn more at www.patakmeats.com then plan some meals and go shopping.


